A Word from Andrew

A recent article by Hannah Yang in the Spinoff was entitled, "Can a crossword be racist?" There was a

clue in the newspaper's cryptic crossword which read, "Chink, i.e. Chinese leader concerned with evil doing." Is this a racist clue, do you think? Hannah, a Chinese kiwi, thought it was and complained to the Dominion Post, but they declined to make an apology as "no one else had complained." Many people are waking up the "casual" racism and sexism that is rife in Aotearoa NZ. But others complain about "pc gone mad". Yang writes, "So when it comes to racism, we have a collective duty as a society. If we've had experiences, we should share them, and share them civilly. Well-meaning people won't realise why it's problematic to tell a person of Asian appearance "Your English is very good!" unless we talk about it." So true! And the church should be at the forefront of promoting kindness and civil discussion about racism and diversity.

Devotion

"Whoever loves money never has enough; whoever loves wealth is never satisfied with their income. This too is meaningless. How much is enough?" Ecclesiastes 5:10

It's fairly easy for me to criticise other people for being materialistic. I can see conspicuous consumption in others; I am not quite so sharp in seeing it in myself. Even though I don't have a Porsche, golf club membership, or second home, I am just as much at risk of being seduced by the addictive allure of "MoneyMoneyMoney" as any wealthy person.

Money is an amazing tool. It concentrates power and makes it portable. It allows you to accumulate things that you want and get other people to do what you want. To some degree those are good things. But it is a small step from working hard to accumulate wealth to falling in love with the power it brings you. How do you know when you have enough? You know you're in trouble when money is at the core of what makes you feel safe and secure, when money is at the core of whether or not you feel that your life is a success, when money is at the core of your personal happiness. God made us to be connected in love to other people. Even more, God made us to find our greatest fulfillment, satisfaction, and happiness in loving and serving him first.

Do you believe that?
